Adichie, Chimamanda Ngozi. "Dream Count: A Novel" 2025

Set in Nigeria and America, Dream Count is centered on four women and depicts the complexity of each of their lives and each's reflections on becoming the best versions of themselves. Is true happiness ever attainable or is it just a fleeting state? And how honest must we be with ourselves in order to love, and to be loved? A trenchant reflection on the choices we make and those made for us, on daughters and mothers, on our interconnected world, "Dream Count" pulses with emotional urgency and poignant, unflinching observations on the human heart, in language that soars with beauty and power.

Aguda, 'Pemi. "Ghostroots: Stories" 2024

A debut collection of stories set in a hauntingly reimagined Lagos where characters vie for freedom from ancestral ties. In "The Hollow," an architect stumbles on a vengeful house.

Armstrong, Tammy. "Pearly Everlasting" 2024

New Brunswick, 1934. When a cook in a logging camp finds an orphaned baby bear, he brings it home to his wife, who names the cub Bruno and raises him alongside their newborn daughter, Pearly. Amidst poverty and dangerous work conditions, the camp embraces the tame, young bear. But when a new supervisor — who increasingly endangers the lives of the loggers for profit — arrives, he is less accepting. When the supervisor is found dead, Bruno is blamed, and soon after is abducted and sold to an animal trader. Determined to rescue him, Pearly sets off on a hazardous journey through the forest—her first trip to "the Outside." In a narrative sown with folklore and superstition, this story is a woodland Gothic about the triumph of good over evil and the forgotten beauty of the natural world.

In 1980, a wealthy businessman named Carl Fletcher is kidnapped from his driveway, brutalized and held for ransom. But now, nearly 40 years later, it's clear that perhaps nobody ever got over anything, after all.

The epistolary style facilitates deliberate but subtle world building in this fantastic romance. "Bridgerton" meets "20,000 Leagues Under an Alien Sea" – great for readers who enjoy a blending of genres and themes.

Desai, Anita. "Rosarita" 2024

A student sits on a bench in a park in San Miguel, Mexico. Bonita is away from her home in India to learn Spanish. She is alone, somewhere she has no connection to. A woman approaches her. The woman claims to recognize Bonita because she is the spitting image of her mother, who made the same journey from India to Mexico as a young artist. No, says Bonita, my mother didn't paint. She never travelled to Mexico. But this woman insists, and so Bonita follows her. Into a story where Bonita and her mother will move apart and come together, and where the past threatens to flood the present, or re-write it. A haunting novella exploring memory, grief, and a young woman's determination to forge her own path.

Erdrich, Louise. "The Mighty Red" 2024

Come visit Tabor, North Dakota, home of beet farms, fracking, and the Red River Valley. Most of the novel's action occurs during the economic crisis of 2008 and its aftermath, and focuses on Crystal, a descendent of Ojibwe field hands and a hauler for the industrial sugar beet plant, her 18-year-old daughter Kismet, and Crystal's problematic husband, Martin. Kismet, who once toyed with being a goth, marries Gary, the troubled son of the largest beet grower in the area. She is in love with Hugo, a high school dropout, which further complicates the situation. Erdrich excels at the slow simmer, and once again she delivers a deliciously seductive masterwork.

Everett, Percival. "James" 2024

A brilliant reimagining of Adventures of Huckleberry Finn — both harrowing and satirical — told from the enslaved Jim's point of view. When Jim overhears that he is about to be sold to a man in New Orleans, separated from his wife and daughter forever, he runs away until he can formulate a plan. Meanwhile, Huck has faked his own death to escape his violent father. As all readers of American literature know, thus begins the dangerous and transcendent journey by raft down the Mississippi River toward the elusive and unreliable promise of the Free States and beyond.

Fieto, Virginia. "Victorian Psycho." 2025

Be forewarned, reader, this one is not for the faint of heart. Winifred Notty arrives at Ensor House prepared to play the perfect governess — she'll dutifully tutor her charges, Drusilla and Andrew, tell them bedtime stories, and only joke about eating children. But long, listless days spent within the estate's dreary confines come with an intimate knowledge of the perversions and pathetic preoccupations of the Pounds family. Winifred must have patience, for Christmas is coming, and she has very special gifts planned for the dear souls of Ensor House. Brimming with black humor and culminating in a shockingly vile tableau, it's unlikely you'll ever forget the governess of Ensor House.

A poet's life is turned inside out by a sudden, wrenching pain which brings him to his knees — and eventually to the ICU. Set at the furthest edges of human experience, Greenwell throws the forces that give life value — art, memory, poetry, music, care — into sharp relief. Time expands and contracts. Sudden intimacies bloom. "Small Rain" surges beyond the hospital to encompass a radiant vision of human life: our shared vulnerability, the limits and possibilities of sympathy, the ideal of art and the fragile dream of America. Above all, this is a love story of the most unexpected kind.

Horvath, Patrick. "Beneath the Trees Where Nobody Sees" 2024

Live, laugh, shed blood. And don't murder the locals. This is small-town serial killer, upstanding citizen, and adorable brown bear Samantha Strong's cardinal rule. After all, there's a sea of perfectly ripe potential victims in the big city just beyond the forest, and when you've worked as hard as Sam to build a cozy life and a thriving business in a community surrounded by friendly fellow animal folk, warm decor, and the aroma of cedar trees and freshly baked apple pie ... the last thing you want is to disturb the peace. You can imagine her indignation when one of Woodbrook's own meets a grisly, mysterious demise — and you wouldn't blame her for doing anything it takes to hunt down her rival before the town self-destructs.

Kawaguchi, Toshikazu. "Before We Forget Kindness" 2024

In this fifth installment in the series, readers meet a young boy trying to come to terms with his parents' divorce ("The Son"); a new mother whose husband was killed before he could meet and name their infant daughter ("The Nameless Child"); a woman who eloped without her father's blessing and now needs his forgiveness ("The Father"); and two best friends driven apart by painful romantic secrets ("The Valentine"). The focus on regret and grief makes this a heart-wrenching outing, but kindness and empathy still shine through in Kawaguchi's characters.

Kingfisher, T. "A Sorceress Comes to Call" 2024

A dark retelling of the Brothers Grimm's "Goose Girl," rife with secrets, murder, and forbidden magic. This book is a mix of a parental abuse story and Victorian comedy of manners, with psychological horror vibes and a sprinkling of lightheartedness thrown in. It's a strange combination but it works here.

Knútsdóttir, Hilda. "The Night Guest" 2024

An eerie and ensnaring story set in contemporary Reykjavík that's sure to keep you awake at night. Iðunn is in yet another doctor's office. She knows her constant fatigue is a sign that something's not right, but practitioners dismiss her symptoms and blood tests haven't revealed any cause. She tries to follow the advice of friends and family, buying everything from vitamins to sleeping pills to a step-counting watch. Nothing helps. Until one night, Iðunn falls asleep with the watch on, and wakes up to find she's walked over 40,000 steps in the night. What happens when she's asleep? Why is she waking up with increasingly disturbing injuries? And why won't anyone believe her?

Lalami, Laila. "The Dream Hotel" 2025

Sara has just landed at LAX, returning home from a conference abroad, when she's detained by the Risk Assessment Administration, a federal agency that uses biometric data to assess citizens' "pre-crime" tendencies. She's done nothing troubling, but her "risk score" is high enough to force a stay at a "retention center." But a planned three weeks of observation extends with every deviation from the strict and ever-shifting rules of the facility. Months pass and Sara seems no closer to release — until a new resident arrives, disrupting the order of the facility and leading Sara on a collision course with the very companies that have deprived her of her freedom.

Messud, Claire. "This Strange Eventful History" 2024

Messud's newest is a semi-autobiographical novel of her own family history, an epic generational story that sprawls across the world and from the 1940s to 2010. The fictional Cassars were what the French call "pieds-noirs," ethnically French but born and living in Algeria, until the upheaval of World War II and Algeria's independence from France left them without a homeland. Each chapter is part of the larger picture of the Cassar family history, told from one character's perspective. The anxiety and emotional turmoil the whole family feels about no longer having a home is a thread woven throughout the novel, forcing each character to grapple with where they think they belong in the world.

Moore, Liz. "The God of the Woods" 2024

Early morning, August 1975: a camp counselor discovers an empty bunk. Its occupant, Barbara Van Laar, has gone missing. Barbara isn't just any 13-year-old, she's the daughter of the family that owns the summer camp and employs most of the region's residents. And this isn't the first time a Van Laar child has disappeared. Barbara's older brother similarly vanished 14 years ago, never to be found. As a panicked search begins, a thrilling drama unfolds. Chasing down the layered secrets of the Van Laar family and the blue-collar community working in its shadow, Moore's multi-threaded story invites readers into a rich and gripping dynasty of secrets and second chances.

O'Connor, Elizabeth. "Whale Fall" 2024

In this luminous first novel, an isolated community of 12 families encounters a pair of outsiders on their small island off the coast of Wales in 1938. Manod, 18, lives with her lobsterman father and younger sister and sees a circumscribed future for herself on the remote and rugged island. Then a dead whale washes up on the beach. This incident is immediately followed by the arrival of an English couple, Edward and Joan, anthropologists from Oxford who have come to the island to study its inhabitants for an ethnographic paper they plan to coauthor. Manod demonstrates her ambition and intelligence to the couple, and they ask her to serve as their secretary and translator, given that few others in the community speak English. Literary voyagers looking for new worlds should add this to their itinerary.

Orange, Tommy. "Wandering Stars" 2024

Colorado, 1864. Star, a young survivor of the Sand Creek Massacre, is brought to the Fort Marion prison castle, where he is forced to learn English and practice Christianity by Richard Henry Pratt, an evangelical prison guard who will go on to found the Carlisle Indian Industrial School, an institution dedicated to the eradication of Native history, culture, and identity. A generation later, Star's son, Charles, is sent to the school, where he is brutalized by the man who was once his father's jailer. Under Pratt's harsh treatment, Charles clings to moments he shares with a young fellow student, Opal Viola, as the two envision a future away from the institutional violence that follows their bloodlines.

Perry, Sarah. "Enlightenment" 2024

Set in the world of Perry's best-selling "The Essex Serpent" (now an Apple TV+ show), this is the story of Thomas and Grace, kindred spirits torn apart. They are eventually drawn to each other again as the mystery of a vanished 19th-century astronomer unfolds, and they contemplate love and fate.

But when her children come under threat,

May is forced to put her trust in a hum of uncertain motives. Set in a future altered by climate change and technology that may feel uncomfortably close at hand, Phillips' new novel shows her talent for finding warmth, humanity, and connection within an all-too-conceivable dystopian landscape.

As she trains for the Boston Marathon early one morning out in the woods, she hears a scream. When she investigates, she finds tire tracks and a lone, beaded earring. Her friends Punk and Gaylyn are two women who don't know what it means to quit; she has her loving husband, Crow, and two beautiful children who challenge her to be better every day. Sam Sax's debut novel opens with his protagonist's (Ezra's) self-immolation. The remainder of the story proceeds in quick, freeze-frame moments from Ezra's life and family history, leading to his death at the end. The novel is replete with vivid images, the strength of which is rare outside of poetry. Sax has produced a work that is meditative, deeply humane, and profoundly original. Less driven by plot than language, emotion, and image — a poet's novel through and through — the result is a searingly beautiful and devastating foray into fiction.

In September 1913, a student suffering from tuberculosis arrives at a health resort in what is now western Poland. Just as Shesheshen's about to confess her identity, Homily reveals something else: She's hunting a shapeshifting monster that supposedly cursed her family. Has Shesheshen seen it anywhere? As the hunt for the monster becomes increasingly deadly, the bigger challenge remains: learning how to build a life with, rather than in, the woman she loves.

Brimming with all the fizz and wildness of New York in the 1960s and '70s, this is the first biography of this extraordinary figure — an unintentional pioneer who became an icon.

One of the ultimate trekking challenges is to hike the length of the Grand Canyon while staying under the rim the entire distance. Author Kevin Fedarko and photographer Pete McBride thought it might be a lark to give it try. They quickly learn, however, that it's no walk in the park. Less than a week after getting started, they hobble out of the canyon, exhausted and barely surviving the ordeal. Wising up, they recalibrate and seek the help of friends and canyon experts to better prepare for the journey. What a journey it turns out to be! Fedarko is a gifted storyteller, and you'll find yourself quickly taken in by his self-deprecating humor as they undertake the trek again, this time with a new reverence for the canyon. But the hike is only one part of the overall story. The broader theme is the Grand Canyon: the river that carved it, its geology, and the cultural and human history imprinted on it.
